The summer has gone and many of us will be reflecting on our exploits during the warmer months.

In a few weeks we will be encouraged to 'remember, remember the 5th of November'.

What is more, this year Armistice Day falls on a Sunday and many from our local community and churches will gather at the War Memorial to mark this moment.

Galeed House

It was great to have friends visiting us from Galeed House recently and to hear more about how their work is going.

Galeed House was opened in September 2001 and is named after the story of Jacob and Laban in Genesis 31 and means "place of meeting". It is situated in Darnall in Sheffield and is a place for Muslims and Christians to come together in peace and to create understanding, break down barriers, and build relationships. The aim is that within these relationships the love of Christ can be demonstrated. Many activities take place at the house including sewing, English teaching, lunch clubs, kids clubs and Mums & Tots.

Please pray for the work, that they will have enough volunteers and resources to be able to continue to work effectively within the local communities, and that people will come to know Jesus as their Saviour.

If you would like to find out more, they have a drop in session on the 2nd Saturday of every month, between 1:00pm and 3:30pm, where you can find out more about their activities and meet the other volunteers.

In Flanders Fields...

During the past four years we have been reminded that it is one hundred years since the First World War. The display of poppies at the Tower of London, the film 'War Horse' and numerous clips of newsreels from the archives all intended to give us some insight as to the terrible conditions the soldiers endured.

Earlier this year Bryan and I decided to visit the sites of WW1, something we had been intending to do for a few years. So at the end of our holiday in France we stayed in Ypres in the Flanders region of Belgium. The top of our bucket list was the Last Post Ceremony at the Menin Gate. Around the walls of the gate (which is actually an archway over the road) are the names of 54,896 British and Commonwealth soldiers who died before August 1917 and have no known grave. The Ceremony is held at 8 p.m. every evening in the year. The Last Post is usually sounded by two firemen but visiting bands and choirs can apply to take part and wreaths are laid on the staircases. The Ceremony usually only lasts for about 10-15 minutes unless it's a special occasion, but as hundreds of people gather we went to the gate half an hour before. We did manage to see most of the activity but decided to get there at 7 p.m. the next evening and got a place at the front of the crowd. As 8 o'clock approached the crowd became silent and, as the saying goes, you could have heard a pin drop. It was a special experience that neither of us will forget.



We also visited the Tyne Cot Cemetery where nearly 12,000 service men are buried. The graves are marked by white headstones which glisten in the sun. Each one is engraved with the details of the soldier buried beneath it. Especially poignant are the ones simply engraved 'Known unto God', reminding us that God knows and loves each one of us. The cemetery is beautifully tended with flowers and shrubs planted at most of the graves. A very peaceful place. Around the perimeter, the walls are inscribed with the names of nearly 35,000 men who were killed after 16th August 1917 and have no known grave. This is in addition to the ones at the Menin Gate.

Sanctuary Wood is *not* a very nice place. It was so named as originally it was a quiet place until it was the scene of a terrible battle. We walked along some of the original trenches on fairly dry duck boards which would become a sea of mud during bad weather. I was pleased to leave there.

In a few weeks time we will be remembering service men and women who gave their lives in the many conflicts that have taken place over the past century. We will then be celebrating the birth of Jesus, God's Son who came to eventually die for us. Let us remember the words written in the Bible. John ch 15 v 13. 'Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends'. Also John ch 3 v 16 'For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life'.

Shoebox

Find a shoebox. Operation Christmas Child boxes are available from church (at no cost), or if you prefer, you can find and wrap your own shoebox.



Boy or Girl

Obtain a label from Hazel, and stick it on your shoebox to show if it is for a girl or a boy and the age.



Fill with Gifts

There are a variety of things that can be put into a shoebox including toys, hats,

scarves, combs, toothbrushes, soap, pens, stickers, and notepads. Please don't include things such as food, medicine, liquids or anything fragile or sharp. Please include a donation of £5 in each box. This covers the cost of getting the shoebox to a child.

Lastly, please remember to pray for the child who will receive your gift, and also for all the volunteers who will ensure that your gift gets there.
