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## Where are you God?

"God often feels distant" is a recent topic of discussion with people lately. These conversations are hard, yet as we pray, we are left with the sense of God's presence and a lift within our spiritual wellness. It's all too easy to let those famous passages of scripture roll off our tongues, "where two or three are gathered..." Matt. 18:20 or some of the Psalms that tell of God's presence in our times of need. These are the absolute truths of God, He is with us even though we may not realise it. Yet times are hard for many right now.

We have spoken of this in our recent sermon series. We saw how God speaks to us in various ways and through various means. Some of you have taken comfort in the knowledge of God being with you through difficult times, when reading scripture or listening to a favourite song. I've had 3 separate conversations with people recently where each person told me that they had been feeling low, yet had a lift in their spirit when they sang the hymn 'Great is thy faithfulness'. They immediately felt secure and at peace when they remembered and sang the lyrics.

The hymn was written by Thomas Obadiah Chisolm (1866-1960) who had a difficult early adult life. His health was so fragile that there were periods of time when he was confined to bed, unable to work. After coming to Christ at age 27, Thomas found great comfort in the Scriptures, and in the fact that God was faithful and his strength in time of illness and

weakness, and provided for his needs. Lamentations 3:22-23 was one of his favourite scriptures: "It is of the Lord's mercies that we are not consumed, because His compassions fail not. They are new every morning: great is Thy faithfulness."

You'll agree that life is difficult at the moment. Many people are unable to spend time with family, others continue to mourn the loss of loved ones that have died recently. There is no doubt that life has changed. We may need to take time to reflect on those changes, take stock of where we are in life and seek what the future may hold for us. Harvest and Remembrance Sunday may be such times where people take time to stop and reflect on life. Who knows how we'll mark these occasions this year if restrictions continue to remain in place! Yet when we consider why Ieremiah wrote the book of Lamentations, we begin to see that God suffers when His people suffer and that there is hope in the midst of affliction and conflict.



## The New World

On 23rd August, we heard a Sunday talk from Olivia Egan, about this verse. We were challenged to think about how our recent experiences during lockdown might shape the future in terms of:

- our lives
- our faith
- our church

Will we strive to go back to exactly how things were before lockdown, or are there things we have learned during this time which will change how we approach things going forwards?

This year, during lockdown and the ongoing coronavirus situation, we've become very aware that our church is much more than just a building on Worksop Road in Swallownest. Our church is a group of Christian people. We are a gathering of believers living in the local area around Swallownest, but also we are a tiny part of the much larger worldwide church of believers.

Although we haven't been able to meet together physically in our church, spiritually we have been able to continue to join together as a community of God's people. We've met and shared in many new and unexpected ways thanks, for example, to the online wonders of YouTube & Zoom & Facebook & WhatsApp! As the noticeboard outside our church has boldly stated in recent times: "Our building may be closed but our church is still open!" Many thanks to everyone who worked hard to make this such a successful event.

As lockdown has eased, we've been able to see our Sunday morning YouTube service being filmed from within the church. However, in case you thought that filming at the church was something very new, recently some wonderful old silent film footage from 1958 appeared on Facebook entitled "The Demolition and Rebuilding of the Swallownest Baptist Church Schoolroom"!





It appears to have been filmed on an old 8mm Cine Film camera, and shows the old school room building, that sits alongside our main church building, being demolished (apparently by hand, brick by brick, by the church members, with little sign of any health and safety risk assessments!).

The footage goes on to show the architects plans for the new schoolroom, the new building emerging with the roof still to be completed, and the church members gathering together outside for a commissioning service as the foundation stone is laid.





The Apostle Peter wrote about all this in one of his two letters to the early church, recorded for us in the Bible. He described how every Christian is a 'living stone' and together we as his people make up the church, with Christ himself as the foundation or 'cornerstone'.

"...you yourselves like living stones are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it stands in Scripture: "Behold, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone chosen and precious, and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame."" 1 Peter 2 v 5&6

Let's thank God for those who have gone before us to provide us with the blessing of our church building which, in time, we will be able to enjoy and benefit from again. In the meantime, let's pray that God will continue to use us, in these unusual times, as he builds his church of 'living stones'!
